



Carbon Monoxide

Did you know?

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas released when fuel is burned. Breathing in carbon monoxide can be dangerous to your health.

Action Plan

- Install a carbon monoxide (CO) detector in all sleeping areas.
- If your CO detector sounds an alarm, make sure it is not the smoke detector.
 - o Check to see if anyone is dizzy, nauseous, or have shortness of breath. If so, leave your home and call 911, as these are signs of CO poisoning.
 - o If no one has symptoms, open the windows and turn off any potential sources of CO (such as gas ovens, furnaces, and space heaters). Have a qualified technician inspect your appliances before turning them back on.
- Fuel burning appliances, fireplaces, and woodstoves should be professionally checked every year (or as recommended by manufacturer).
- Never use gas stoves/ovens or gas space heaters as a heating source for your home.
- Never use a generator inside - they should be at least 20 feet from the home.
- Use barbecue grills and hibachis outdoors in well ventilated spaces, and never inside.
- Regularly maintain and inspect your car; never leave it running in a garage, even if the garage is open.

New York City	Building owners are responsible for installing approved CO detectors, while owners must test them regularly and change the batteries. Visit nyc.gov/health and search "carbon monoxide" to learn more.

New Jersey	njpies.org/carbon-monoxide Most residential buildings are required by law to have a CO sensor device located inside the unit (within 10 feet of a sleeping area).
